We had almost 700 hundred youth from all over Honiara attend the event.



UPDATE ON THE WORK IN VANUATU

We would like to thank the editor of the Pulse Magazine for giving us the opportunity to provide an update of the work in our nation of Vanuatu.

This year has been a difficult year for us. We have faced challenges in our mission work here.

When COVID-19 arrived in our country our government announced a curfew for two months (March and April). All the work of missions stopped, no church services were allowed, and we could not travel to visit our local churches in the islands.

It has also been difficult to start a new class at our World Missions Faith Training School (WMFTS) because there are no new students.

There is a sense of fear in the country as people are instructed to stay in their homes for safety.

I have faced challenges with my health and also my family's health.

I had to undergo surgery for a small lump in my chest and I have been diagnosed with high blood pressure so now I'm under medication.

On Wednesday 16th February my wife had a minor stroke. She had to rest in the house for a couple of months before she could go back to work.

On Sunday 27th March my second son Alfred was involved in a fatal car accident that caused him to be taken

urgently to ICU in Princess Alexandra hospital in Brisbane for treatment.

Alfred travelled to Australia last year for the seasonal workers program. Alfred is recovering well since he has gone through a lot of surgeries.

On behalf of my family I would like to thank everyone that has been praying for us.

Our church services restarted in the month of May after two months COVID-19 restrictions.

Our six pastors with their church members are facing challenges with this current pandemic so please think of them in your prayers.

Our WMFTS has not been in operation for two years due to the COVID-19 situation in our country. It is a very challenging time for us to find new students.

We have other challenges involving the government program that recruits young people to travel to Australia and New Zealand for work. More young people are looking to money rather than to serving God.

Our three staff are still in the school compound looking after the property and maintaining and cleaning the school. We have our missionary couple from PNG, Pr John Unuba Weimani, as well as Willy Malon from Vanuatu.

Despite all of our challenges we are still praying and are looking forward to reopening the school.

We still have work to do around the school. During our last trip we took a

team to the school to build a roof on the staff house.

Our two preschools restarted their classes in the month of May after two months of COVID-19 curfews.

In Port Vila there are 30 students enrolled this year with four female teachers.

Our rural preschool in Eratap village has 12 students with one female teacher.

We feed the children at lunchtime and we also provide day care after preschool finishes to help some of the parents out.

Last year we graduated eight students who went on to enter year one in private and government schools.

This year from Saturday 14th December to Wednesday 18th December we will organise our 14th CRC National Conference in our local church in Malakula island.

We are expecting all of our local church leaders, their youth and church members in the provinces to be present.

We would like to ask for your prayers towards this important event. Please pray for our speakers, for good weather, for the preparations and so on.

We appreciate all of your prayers and welcome any financial support towards our church developments, preschools and WMFTS. You may contact the CRC Missions office if you would like to give financially.

COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA

This is a report on funds that were sent last year for the purchasing and distribution of food to families that have been affected during the COVID-19 pandemic in all of our city churches here in Port Moresby.

A massive thank you to the sponsors for considering families who are struggling in PNG during this time. We believe that the food relief brought smiles to many faces and was a miracle to most of the families.

We were able to purchase food items over two days. Our staff members and pastors here at Bethel Centre helped pack the supplies for the families.

We managed to prepare 200 packs and hand delivered them to families at MacGregor (outreach church), ATS (settlement church), 6 Miles (settlement church) and 2 Miles (settlement church)

200 families received the food packs initially, with an average of 5-10 people per family. Therefore, a total number of 1000-2000 people benefitted from this food relief project.

The people in the outreach church at MacGregor were grateful for the food

donation as it benefitted families who had been laid-off from work during the pandemic. Most of them survived from daily earnings from market produce.

In 2 Miles we had some time of ministry and prayer for the children after distributing food parcels to families. One of the church elders spoke on behalf of the church families and pastors, appreciating all the kind donations made to them. He spoke about how the packs have greatly benefitted families as they are unemployed and have been affected by this pandemic.

Packs were delivered over three days to each of these locations. The remaining packs were given to families here at Bethel Tabernacle of Praise.

After these initial food packs were created and delivered, we managed to purchase another 90 packs using the remaining funds.

The team put together the packages and were able to distribute them to families at Morata (settlement outreach) and to families that attend Bethel Tabernacle of Praise, especially to single parents, widows, unemployed parents and elderly people. The remaining packs were distributed amongst our Bethel Centre families.

Every receiving hand has shown their sincere gratitude towards this food distribution and they are all very appreciative of the kind donations.

We would like to express our appreciation to all who have contributed and worked tirelessly to bring smiles to many faces.

I also spent time taking photos and videos of our new training building that is being built on the Bethel Centre

property. It is an impressive building! I'm excited to see and be part of the amazing things that will flow from it.

One of my favourite parts of my trip was reconnecting with old friends and building deeper connections with others. I absolutely loved all of the fellowship and chats I had with all different people at Bethel Centre. It truly does feel like home!

Dad also had many opportunities to minister with the people on the Bethel Centre property, as well as the church congregation. His trip was full of meetings and other ministry endeavours. He spoke at both services on the first Sunday we were there and had a great time of prayer ministry in the second service. He also had time ministering with the students.

One of the highlights of our trip was going to Gaire village to see our

preschool and visit the church leaders. The preschool is going very well - the kids are so cute! It was very encouraging to see two of our preschool teacher training course graduates running the preschool. What an awesome ministry!

We are hoping to begin our preschool on the Bethel Centre property at the start of 2023 once our training building is complete. We were able to develop further plans for the preschool during this trip and we are excited for all that is to come. Please keep the future of our preschool ministry in PNG in your prayers.

My first overseas missions trip since the COVID-19 pandemic began was such a special experience. The pandemic is almost behind us and the days of heavy international travel restrictions are thankfully coming to an end. Praise the Lord!

FROM OUR LEADERS

Training is one of the four pillars of the vision of Bethel Christian Centre and on a wider scale, of the CRC in PNG. Training at Bethel has played, and continues to play, a vital role in the expansion of the work in PNG and the nations that Bethel is involved in around the world

With the inception of the work at Bethel in the early 1970s up to now, training at Bethel has seen the development and growth of national and international workers who have come through its

training programs.

Bethel has trained pastors, leaders, workers, long and short term missionaries, missions supporters and senders, as well as missions promoters. People have come from all over PNG, nations outside PNG, a range of Christian denominations, the secular field and private sectors within PNG.

The training facilities at Bethel have deteriorated. This new facility that is being built - a double storey building with six classrooms - will enhance the training program and the expansion of the work in PNG and beyond.

Bethel Pastoral Oversight and the team are very thankful to the Lord to be able to see this project being fulfilled. We pray that this project will continue to help fulfil the vision of the CRC movement in the years to come.

UKRAINIAN REFUGEES IN POLAND

On Thursday 24th February 2022 the Russian army launched an attack on Ukraine in many different places, even very close to the Polish border, killing thousands of civilians, including women and children. Just then hundreds of thousands Ukrainians started fleeing from their homes to Poland and different countries in Europe.

As at 16th June, the United Nations records 1,169,497 Ukrainian refugees have entered Poland. The government, churches, organisations and ordinary people started helping them immediately. Their needs were huge. The special law was undertaken.

Poland created places of accommodation and charity food points.

The first to open their homes and accept single families were two groups of people: Christians and Ukrainians who had previously come to Poland for economic reasons.

Very quickly, ordinary people also opened their apartments and took care of individual families. The scale of assistance adjusted to the scale of needs

One of the foreign journalists wrote: "If you are looking for refugee camps in Poland, you will not see them. Poles, instead of camps, opened their apartments, their houses and their hearts."

As a church, we decided to help those who came to Poland first. We sent volunteers to the border and helped them come to Wrocław and find temporary accommodation. Our church has made a decision to help 25 refugees in the long term.

They lived in our houses for the first month and then we rented apartments for them. We have also found schools for their children. At the moment we are looking for jobs so that they can function normally. Nobody expects the war to end soon.

Each of the visiting Ukrainians is a different story and a different struggle Celestina is a student from Kiev. The rocket destroyed the building next to her dormitory. It was then that she decided to pack and, having no passport, she went to the Polish

border. We picked her up from there, rented her an apartment and took care of her.

The trauma of the trip caused Celestina to have health problems. During the trip for several days, there were no hygiene measures or a place to wash herself. In Poland, she needed medical help so that her body could return to normal.

Iryna came to Poland with two daughters. For a few more nights, one of her daughters did not want to change her clothes for the night, because she was afraid that the sirens would blow in a moment and she would have to spend another night in the shelter

Tatiana remembers rocket blasts, the sounds of war and the troops entering her town. It was only when she saw a rocket destroying their church building that she decided to come with her son to Poland. Tatiana is married to a local pastor who stayed in Ukraine to help his neighbors.

These are just three of the stories of the people we are caring for. Each of them has their own individual trauma and needs

We help in three ways:

• We meet material needs: clothes, food, medical care for those who came to us. In Wrocław, several churches have jointly opened two food distribution points, to which about 1,000 people come every day. We support them financially and purchase the most necessary products. As a church, we have opened a meeting point - a place where we help refugees from Ukraine registe with our offices, obtain an ID number, receive funds for children, find a job or a place to live.

Due to the fact that we started working with Ukrainians before the outbreak of the war, we now have Ukrainian-speaking Christians who help to cope with trauma, loss of loved ones, destruction of life's belongings or depression.

 We collect food which we regularly send to places affected by war in Ukraine, where this food is scarce.
 We work with churches in Ukraine and this way we can be sure that all things will go to the most needy.

Thank you for your support, our help can be bigger and more effective. We wholeheartedly thank the CRC churches for their help and support.

Life in Poland has changed. There are 200,000 Ukrainians in our city at the moment. You can see and hear them everywhere, they became an integral part of our society.

Our country is changing for the better. We are more sensitive to our neighbours' harm and aware of their needs. Our churches are now primarily concerned with helping refugees.

It is not easy, the global crisis seems to be taking the biggest toll in Poland. There are price increases everywhere, but with the refugee crisis and the war in Ukraine, it seems to be even more complex in Poland.
