Our CRC National Missions Sunday for 2020 is on Sunday 26th July, or a Sunday as close to that date that is practical for you. This is a great opportunity for us to focus on our CRC International Vision of a Presence in Every Nation by 2045.

Over 90% of our CRC Churches in Australia are actively involved in global missions and together we are touching, to varying degrees, about 70 nations. The CRC Missions Sunday is a time to highlight to your church what you, and our other CRC Churches are doing in global missions. Our people have large "forgeteries" and "out of sight is out of mind." We need to regularly present our global mission's involvement and the CRC International vision.

This year will be quite different for our Missions Sunday. Some of our churches will be meeting in person, but many will still be only able to meet on-line because of the coronavirus restrictions. However, the creativity that churches have shown for their normal Sunday services on-line, will ensure great Mission Day services.

What about?

- Music team on stage dressed in the national costume/dress of their country of origin.
- If all meeting in person, encourage everybody to come in their national costume/dress.
- An item from an ethnic group in your church.
- Set up a mission expo of nations where your church is involved this could be a virtual display or a physical one depending on your circumstances.
- If meeting in person provide some delicious food after the service from different nations.

The following thought from Max Chismon of Living Springs International my stir your thinking for your message.

"The Old Testament is full of promises and prophecies of a worldwide ingathering of peoples and people into God's kingdom.
